### URBAN ANTHROPOLOGY: CITIES IN THE MIDDLE EAST

(BEIRUT, TEHRAN, CAIRO, DUBAI)

This course proposes an anthropological analysis of urban life with focus on the Middle Eastern cities. Through exploring cities in this region this course deals with social processes, such as mobility, gender, generational conflicts, citizenship, and social movements. Through case studies of major cities in the region this course will explore the impacts they have on individuals and on social relationships. Offering a critical approach to the Orientalist images of the Middle East, the main purpose of this course is to deepen students' understandings of social processes in this region.

The key topics in the course are:

- Urban poverty and marginalization
- Street politics
- The main effects of globalization
- Migration and influx of refugees into cities
- Emergence of 'Hyper-Global cities' in the Persian Gulf
- The impact of neo-liberal economic policies and emergence of mass-consumption societies
