WOMEN'S ACCESS TO JUSTICE IN IRAN

Iranian justice system faces various challenges that consist of issues such as inadequate, long and discriminatory remedies, a lack of gender sensitisation, failure to protect the poor and marginalised groups, or a lack of transparency and accountability. My socio-legal research focuses on Iranian women's access to justice and barriers they face in their path to justice. Based on my findings of a survey study on the perceptions of Iranian women about justice, I will talk about Iranian women's basic legal knowledge, their familiarity with legal procedure, perceptions of cultural barriers, issues that influence their preference for mechanisms of formal or alternative dispute solutions, and their level of satisfaction with their chosen courses of action.

Sahar Maranlou is the author of *Access to Justice in Iran: Women, Perceptions and Reality* (Cambridge University Press, 2014). Dr. Maranlou is a Postdoctoral Research Officer in the Modern Middle Eastern Studies, University of Oxford. She has written extensively on topics such gender and Islamic Law taught Islamic law and International Human Rights.
